
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

## THE FOUR RULES OF SWING ARTICULATION

I HAVE FOUND THAT LEARNING THE "PULES" OF SWING APTICULATIONS AND PRINFORCING THE "PULES" THROUGH COMPOSITIONS HAS DRAMATICALLY HELPED MY STUDENTS IMPROVE THEIR JAZZ STYLE. THESE PULES APPLY VIRTUALLY ALL OF THE TIME. PRACTICE THEM. IF YOU MAKE THEM A HABIT YOU WILL DRASTICALLY IMPROVE YOUR STYLE.

RULE 1: ANY EIGHTH NOTE THAT IS FOLLOWED BY ANY TYPE OF REST IS ALWAYS SHORT! REPEATED EIGHTH NOTES ON THE SAME PITCH ARE ALWAYS LEGATO.


SAY "DOO-DOO-DOO-DOOT"



**QULE 2:** When articulating triplets, tongue the first note of the triplet legato, slur to the second, and tongue the last note staccato. You should say "DOO-OOH-DOOT." When a triplet occurs on a repeated note, tongue the first two notes of the triplet legato and the last staccato. You should say "DOO-DOO-DOOT."



**RULE 3:** When playing a series of eighth notes that start on the down beat, tongue the first and second legato, then tongue every other off beat legato. Say "DOO-DOO-OOH-DOO," ETC.



RULE 4: When playing a series of eighth notes that start on an upbeat, tongue the first legato and then tongue every other off beat legato.



It is crucial to make gazz articulations a habit! Do them all the time, even when they are not written in.
